THE CHAPTER HOUSE

Taking care of a 95-year-old building that is occupied by 35 active Undergraduate Brothers is a challenge, to say the least. Thank goodness the House has really good bones and with **Cal Stuckman's** leadership and generosity we were able to do a significant renovation in 2007.

There are things, however, that were not part of the renovation and are now approaching 100 years in service. One of my key objectives as Alumni House Manager is keeping water in the right places, and that means the outside water from coming in and the water in the mechanical systems, inside the pipes.

Here is a short summary of some recent improvements, as well as some items that are currently in process: three years ago, we replaced the oversized boiler with two smaller and much more efficient ones. After some tweaking of the control systems, we are now operating at peak efficiency.

Shortly after the boiler installation one of the two heat exchangers that make the domestic hot water died and was replaced. The second one very recently gave up the ghost. I delivered a new one in September and our full-time maintenance man, Doug Sampsel, has completed the installation. Kudos to **Brother Byron Woodrum** who made a sizable donation, which allowed us to replace the three entrance doors to the house with brand new custom millwork solid oak doors. (Who knows how many times

those were opened and closed over the past 95 years?)

In a month we will be repairing and returning to service five air handling units that provide the primary ventilation to the house. Our next major project will be to replace the casement windows with stronger metal ones with much simpler hardware. By the way, having Doug handle our maintenance and repairs has saved us significant expense compared with the use of outside contractors.

I would be remiss if I did not mention a future liability that requires our attention very soon, the roof! The slate has held up well over all of these many years, but we did need to replace one area last year. The nails that hold it on do not have the same durability as the slate itself, and even the slate does not last forever as water penetrates the edges and causes it to delaminate. We are currently acquiring budget pricing for replacement, either in slate or standing seam metal. More to come on that in future reports.

As a 1968 graduate, I never lived in this house. Many of you, like me, remember the house at the corner of Burrowes and Pollock. We all refer to that as the Old House, but in truth, the current house is actually older than the Old House at the time we lived in it! I am happy to report that with four years of "culture sensitivity training" the current Brothers are taking on the responsibility of respecting their house in the same manner that we always did.

Paver Campaign Update

The second batch of pavers were installed ahead of the Alpha Chi annual golf outing. There are now four full sections of engraved pavers on the patio. We appreciate the 150+ brothers and sweethearts who have purchased pavers. Your financial support of Alpha Chi via the Paving the Way campaign is going directly to the facility project of replacing the slate roof on our Chapter House.

Two pledge classes are very close to achieving 100 percent participation and becoming the first to have a pledge class paver



installed at no additional cost.
The Fall of 1983 pledge class has 80 percent participation with eight of 10 brothers purchasing individual pavers, and the Fall of 1968 pledge class has eight of 1 brothers (two

additional bothers are deceased) who have purchased individual pavers.

We have had a number of Alpha Chi brothers who have entered the Chapter Eternal, and **Jay Corrigan '57** is leading a group in purchasing memorial pavers for deceased brothers from his era. Says Jay, "Last year I was in contact with 16 alumni and some widows from the late 50's and early 60's era who wanted to remember a '58 alum and his sweetheart who died within three months of each other. We did this because of its permanence and to carry on a tradition of

remembrance. We are beginning the process of remembering three more deceased alumni in the same way."

WHAT IS KRACH TRANSFORMATIONAL LEADERSHIP WORKSHOP (KTLW)?

In August 2018, Keith Krach (Purdue '79 and former Chairman and CEO of DocuSign Corporation as well as U.S. Under Secretary of State) made an endowment level gift to the Sigma Chi Foundation that established the Krach Transformational Leaders Workshops (KTLW). This replaced the Balfour Leadership Training Workshops as the largest leadership training event in the Greek-letter fraternal world. KTLW consists of a four-day leadership event that focuses on personal and professional development of Sigma Chi undergraduates, developing them into Transformational Leaders in their chapters and on their campuses. Three different certificate programs comprise the KTLW Curriculum: Values Based Leadership, True North Leadership (based on a book written by Brother Bil George -Georgia Tech '64), and Servant Leadership. KTLW is conducted annually in August at Ohio's Bowling Green State University. Last year, the Krach Transformational leadership Workshop Courses were certified by the Middle States Association, the highest-level educational certification agency in the United States. Several of our Alpha Chi undergraduates have participated in KTLW over the past five years and Alumnus Jim Cooper 73' has served as a KTLW on -site Facilitator in both 2022 and 2023.
