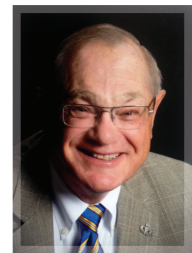

Thanks to our chapter's yearlong canning and fundraising efforts with Alpha Omicron Pi, we placed third among Greek organizations, contributing \$267,010.17 toward Penn State's \$13,343,517.33 total that will be given to the Four Diamonds Fund at Penn State

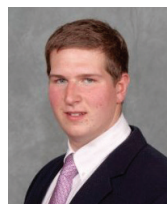
## SENIOR SPOTLIGHT

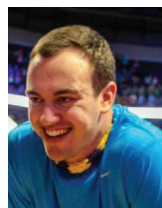

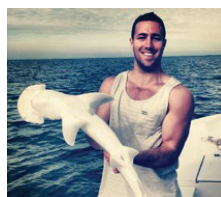

### Join Us This Year for the Largest Greek Alumni Golf Outing at Penn State

Please join us June 6-8 for our 24th Annual Sigma Chi Golf and Alumni Weekend. Our event has grown from several foursomes coming back to Penn State for a weekend in 1990 and informally cooking a few steaks on the side porch of the house, to the largest Greek alumni golf event at Penn State, with more than 100 alumni playing golf last year and more than 120 attending the 'famous' steak bake!

Often imitated, never surpassed – our golf and alumni weekend features another outstanding schedule for our brothers, family and friends in 2014. Our annual event is open to all Sigma Chis in good standing and their friends, family or guests.

We will have our popular Friday event on June 6, playing the venerable White Course at Penn State. The Penn State Golf Course practice facility will be open to attendees at 10:30 a.m. and lunch will be available starting at 10:45 a.m. This is individual stroke play, but there will be a foursome prize for our fun and unique annual team event, as well as recognition of the individual low gross and net and customary skills events for the day.

Golf and cart fees, range balls and lunch are all included, as well as a vast selection of adult and alternative beverages on the course.

Our "signature" Saturday tournament on June 7 is a handicapped team scramble. This is generally a fun competition. All teams will be in a position to compete and aspire to win the coveted Tacky Jacket as recognition for the low net team champions and join a distinguished group of past champions. There will also be a set of inspiring Nittany Lion statues for the low gross team champions. Traditional prizes for longest drive, straightest drive and closest to the pin, as well as second and third place in the net and gross flights will be awarded as well. Golf and cart fees, range balls, a commemorative tournament keepsake, and "lunch at the turn" (hot dog or deli sandwich, chips and a drink) are all included, as well as a selection of adult and alternative beverages on the course.

For both days, you will need to indicate your handicap (USGA index or best estimate) and list of expected or planned teammates for each day when registering. If you don't have

a team, we'll be happy to partner you with other players of equal temperament, talent and conviction.

On Saturday night, whether you're a golfer or not, please join us at our chapter house for cocktails and dinner. This is a chance for brothers and friends of all ages to socialize and recount the events of the weekend. A top-shelf bar will be provided, along with hearty appetizers, culminating with a gourmet steak dinner. The highly anticipated awards ceremony kicks off at approximately 6:30 p.m., followed by dinner. Past champions are reminded to wear their "Tacky Jackets" this evening, as part of our tradition – and as always a fine selection of cigars will be available after dinner.

Before you head home on Sunday, June 8, please set aside an hour and join us at 9:00 a.m. at the house for coffee and donuts and to get an update from the house corporation leadership on the state of the chapter.

Hershey Children's Hospital.

On Saturday afternoon, Jay Paterno — former assistant football coach and son of Joe Paterno — paid a visit to the THON dancers. He summarized the impact of pediatric cancer in a very powerful way. "A couple of weeks ago, I was in Hershey and toured the children's hospital. The woman who runs the Four Diamonds Fund was asked what the survival rate was. She said, 'We save four out of every five children here.' I couldn't bear to be without one of my five kids. Think about that. That is why you are here ... because we are going to make it five out of every five ... Every year you do this, we are knocking at the door a little more and a little more. In the very near future, Penn State students are going

to kick in that damn door."

As the crowd erupted in screams and applause, parents could be seen holding tightly to those THON children who have embraced the hearts of our Greek community at Penn State. It is the power of hope ... hope for one more day, week, month or year ... that our chapter is helping to give to families across the state. We are fortunate to be part of such a life-giving effort at Penn State that does, in fact, redefine the possibilities.

Also speaking to the dancers was Penn State's newly appointed football coach, James Franklin. "Everybody thinks that what makes us special is the football stadium or the basketball arena. That has nothing to do with what makes us special. What makes

us special is the people ... the people that understand we are part of something greater than just ourselves. We can make a difference in people's lives."

So, thank you to our dancers, brothers who stood by the dancers, captains, parents who attended, alumni who stopped by and to the entire THON organization for its incredible support. This is why ... WE ARE.
