Alpha Chi Takes Leadership in Formation of New IFC

Sam Lanza, former Alpha Chi consul and founding president of the new State College Interfraternity Council (SCIFC), speaking at a press conference to introduce the SCIFC in March.

Sigma Chi, Tau Kappa Epsilon (TKE), and Pi Kappa Alpha (Pika) have united to form the State College Interfraternity Council (SCIFC).

House Corporation President **Jim Lundy '82** and former undergraduate Consul Sam Lanza have taken strong leadership roles in forming and announcing the newly minted SCIFC. We are proud to announce that Sam Lanza is the founding president of the new interfraternity organization.

The impetus for establishing the SCIFC has been the long-standing difficulty and relentless hostility that the Penn State Administration has subjected independent fraternities, including Sigma Chi.

Mike Church, Executive Director at Sigma Chi Headquarters, has strongly supported Alpha Chi's participation and leadership in SCIFC. Additionally, the Executive Board of Sigma Chi International has given their approval.

Each of the three fraternities is no longer affiliated with Penn State, and the SCIFC will not affiliate with the university. However, the end goal is to work in tandem with Penn State Administration.

The SCIFC's mission is twofold: to cultivate a stronger sense of brotherhood among its

members and to make a meaningful impact on the State College community through dedicated service initiatives. The council aims to foster an environment where members can develop leadership skills, build lasting relationships, and contribute to the betterment of their surroundings.

At a press conference held in March, Sam Lanza said that the SCIFC will be student-run and student-governed. The council is interested in welcoming other fraternities that would become independent from Penn State. Lanza will lead an objective to be free from the draconian, restrictive compliance environment currently mandated by the university upon fraternities.

Jim Edwards, a Sigma Phi Epsilon alumnus and president of the Lion Fraternity Alumni Association (LFAA), a group formed to help fraternities address common issues, detailed some of the problems, including not being permitted to recruit freshmen and not having their own judicial system. Edwards said that SCIFC will work to allow freshman recruiting during the fall semester and get them into fraternity houses before their sophomore year, making them better neighbors and more understanding of their fraternities' standards and goals

IBM employees, and a significant portion of the company's profits. The complexity of doing business across so many cultures was a huge challenge, and Rich successfully managed growth during his tenure.

In 2016, Rich took a dinner meeting with a former IBM executive who continued to be part of his network. That former colleague was CEO at Tech Data Corp. (TD). He offered Rich to the opportunity to join TD as chief operating officer with a two-year pathway to the CEO position. Rich self-evaluated and determined that he possessed the right stuff for success in the TD opportunity. From there, the rest is business history. Rich became CEO in 2018 and, a few years later, orchestrated the merger of TD with SYN-NEX to become a behemoth IT aggregator company.

Rich assumed the position of CEO at TD-SYNNEX, running a business with annual sales of \$57 billion. After spending four years in that role and successfully leading the integration of the two companies, Rich recently retired.

Did you know that one of your Alpha Chi brothers was recently chief executive officer of a Fortune 100 Company?

That would be **Rich Hume '82**, who retired from that position at TD-SYNNEX this past September.

Rich was born and raised in Clarks Summit, Pennsylvania, in what he describes as a modest home, but where he was wanting for nothing. Enrolling at Penn State University Park, he quickly became interested in economics. Rich's dad, however, gently steered him in a direction with far more job opportunities. He selected accounting and finance as majors within the College of Business Administration.

Rich followed the lead of his apartment roommate, **Kevin Murray '83**, in rushing and

pledging at Sigma Chi.

Upon graduation, Rich spent two years at a public accounting firm. That experience caused him to realize that other areas of private industry would be of more significant interest to him. The International Business Machines (IBM) Corporation offered Rich that opportunity and he began a career at IBM that would be sustained for 30 years.

Rich had successful stints in financial, supply chain, and commercial assignments, demonstrating business acumen and leadership and managerial skills. This was so much the case that he was offered the top executive position for all of IBM Europe.

Working from Madrid, Spain, Rich's scope of responsibility included 40 countries, \$35 billion in annual revenues, 50,000

The SCIFC will feature its own student-run judicial system for dealing with complaints or possible violations. The organization confirmed it would potentially suspend fraternities found violating hazing protocols. Additionally, SCIFC will partner with security firm Standing Stone Consulting to implement a proactive risk management and safety environment.

Lanza said, "Fraternities at Penn State were founded more than 140 years ago as independent organizations, and with SCIFC, we are charting a new independent structure for our immediate future and success." Lanza went on to say that the goal is creating a Greek Life experience that is both personally enriching and socially responsible.

Jim Lundy has declared that Alpha Chi is optimistic and proud to be a pioneering charter member of the State College Interfraternity Council.

A New Parking Lot and Basketball Court - after 54 years

The campaign to modernize our property never ends. The famous side parking lot, which started as a tennis court in 1928 when it was owned by Delta Tau Delta, had seen better days. Large potholes had emerged. Thanks to ongoing donations and a very strong financial operation, we had the money and got competitive bids for replacing the lot.

We had originally considered milling the surface, but it was in such poor condition that the contractor had to completely remove the old surface. They added new stone and compacted the base. The contractor did a fantastic job, and a stencil firm came out and painted the lines for parking and half-court basketball.

Before someone asks why we did not make it bigger, we have reached the legal limit on how much of the lot could be impervious. We would need to construct a storm-water management system if we exceed that amount.

Basketball Hooping and more

Now, besides great parking, the big bonus for the brothers is that they can play basketball anytime they want. Thanks goes out to Significant Sig Rich Hume for buying one of the commercial hoops. We do plan to paint the entire surface and use Sigma Chi colors.

With the Loughheed and Murphy turf field and the new basketball court, our brothers are ready for all kinds of athletic endeavors.
